Record number of kidney transplants performed

Organ Donation Week saw a record number of kidney transplants carried out at the QEUH - the West of Scotland's kidney transplant centre.

Our kidney transplant surgeons carried out 10 kidney transplants during the week – a more than 300% increase on the number carried out at the same time last year.

In total, September has already seen 20 kidney transplants carried out in contrast to nine in August.

Marc Clancy, clinical lead in renal transplant, said: "Renal transplants are associated with improved patient survival and a vastly improved quality of life compared with dialysis." <u>Click here to read more.</u>
